WOL – Wolfram Syndrome

NIHR BioResource - Rare Diseases study project

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Summary

Wolfram syndrome is a rare genetic disease causing childhood onset diabetes and blindness. Children go blind by their midteens and the disease is life limiting due to degeneration of the brain. The underlying disease may be a model for more common diseases that cause brain degeneration.

We have laboratory based evidence for the first treatment for the disease, but we do not have anything to measure that will tell us if the treatment is slowing down the disease process. This application is to develop measures (biomarkers) that will allow us to move to clinical trials of new treatments.
